Message from the Chief



On behalf of the members of the West Lafayette Fire Department (WLFD), it is my pleasure to present the *West Lafayette Fire Department Annual Report 2021*. This comprehensive report summarizes the responses, activities, training, and the resulting statistical data for the year. Twenty twenty-one was a year of not only challenges but also opportunities and growth in our department.

Our highly skilled and motivated firefighters, officers, and inspectors navigated the ever-changing pandemic landscape, continuing to provide top-notch emergency care to our City. Our overall call volume was up 18% over last year and up over 10%

when compared to pre-pandemic levels. We added another inspector mid-year which helped increase our number of inspections by 17% over pre-pandemic levels. Our community engagement grew throughout the year, expanding our fire extinguisher training as well as our Child Safety Seat programs. We interacted with thousands of residents, spreading the fire safety message at various Farmers' Markets, festivals, and station tours.

In June, WLFD had its first Change-of-Command Ceremony. After almost ten years of service as Fire Chief, Tim Heath retired and moved to Texas. We thank him for his service and wish him and his family the best. I was honored to be appointed WLFD's Fire Chief and look forward to working alongside our team of officers and firefighters as we move into this next chapter in our department.

We continue to foster strong relationships with our neighboring fire departments through planning, training, and emergency response. Over the year, we trained and responded with the Lafayette, Tippecanoe Township, Purdue, and Wabash fire departments. We look forward to continued cooperation with these outstanding departments as we work to make our communities safer places to work, live, and play.

As Fire Chief, I am honored to lead WLFD. I would like to thank all members of our fire department for their commitment and professionalism as they daily serve our community. I would also like to thank Mayor Dennis as well as our other City staff, elected officials, and boards for their support over the year. We could not accomplish what we do without their support.





Battalion Chief John Irr replaced Need as the Deputy Chief of Operations.


The City witnessed the completion of several construction projects, including our very own West Lafayette Wellness and Aquatic Center. With this growth came an increase in both the amount of and intensity of our department training. In 2021, the WLFD put in 11,251.75 combined man hours of training, including EVOC, Medical Training, Map Study, Pre-Plans, Search and Rescue, Ventilation, Hose Line Operations,

and world-class fire training under live-fire conditions.


The department made 2,876 emergency runs and performed 1,075 inspections ...ensuring West Lafayette is always a safe and great place to work, live, and play.











2021 Responses by Month











2021 Highlights

<u>January:</u> WLFD responded to 248 calls: 149 Medical, 5 Fire, 6 Hazardous Condition, 20 Service Calls, 11 Good-Intent, 17 False Alarms, and 40 Other. Inspector Molter kicked off the year with 59 new construction inspections and prepared for second semester Greek housing inspections. HOTWORX opened as did the West Lafayette Wellness and Aquatic Center.


<u>February:</u> WLFD responded to 188 calls: 113 Medical, 8 Fire, 2 Hazardous Condition, 28 Service Calls, 9 Good-Intent Calls, 27 False Alarms, and 1 Special Incident. Inspector Molter performed 85 inspections, including spring semester Greek housing and new construction. And several personnel participated in the virtual 12th annual Polar Plunge to benefit Special Olympics.

<u>March:</u> WLFD responded to 222 calls: 148 Medical, 11 Fire, 12 Hazardous Condition, 18 Service Calls, 20 False Alarms, 4 Special Incident, and 9 Other. Inspector Molter performed 87 inspections, including new and existing buildings. McAllister's opened.

<u>April:</u> WLFD responded to 222 calls: 155 Medical, 9 Fire, 7 Hazardous Condition, 14 Service Calls, 26 False Alarms, and 11 Other. Aron Thompson and Wes Geib joined the department. Inspector Molter performed 61 inspections. Raising Cane's, in The Rise building, opened.

May: WLFD responded to 234 calls: 177 Medical, 5 Fire, 10 Hazardous Condition, 15 Service Calls, 16 False Alarms, 1 Special Incident, and 10 Other. Inspector Molter performed 65 inspections, and the department added another Fire Inspector: Ty Morris.

June: WLFD responded to 206 calls: 140 Medical, 5 Fire, 4 Hazardous Condition, 10 Service Calls, 30 False Alarms, and 17 Other. Inspector Molter performed 65 new construction and 56 existing building inspections in preparation for Purdue's fall session. The Homestead opened at its new location, and the Friendship House completed its addition. And new Fire Chief Jeff Need took charge after the retirement of Chief Tim Heath.



July: WLFD responded to 258 calls: 181 Medical, 9 Fire, 4 Hazardous Condition, 28 Service Calls, 32 False Alarms, and 4 Other. Inspector Molter performed 58 new and 171 existing building inspections. The new Campus House building opened.

August: WLFD responded to 242 calls: 176 Medical, 8 Fire, 3 Hazardous Condition, 19 Service Calls, 17 False Alarms, 1 Special Incident, and 18 Other. Randy Weaver and Conner Stacy joined the department. Inspector Molter performed 155

inspections, including the start of Greek buildings. And both Evergreen and Provenance apartments opened with full occupancy.

<u>September:</u> WLFD responded to 274 calls: 197 Medical, 5 Fire, 15 Hazardous Condition, 16 Service Calls, 24 False Alarms, and 17 Other. Inspector Molter and team performed 134 inspections, including all Greek housing.

October: WLFD responded to 294 calls: 192 Medical, 5 Fire, 7 Hazardous Condition, 17 Service Calls, 44 False Alarms, 1 Special Incident, and 28 Other. Inspector Molter and team performed 384 inspection hours.

November: WLFD responded to 240 calls: 152 Medical, 10 Fire, 12 Hazardous Condition, 18 Service Calls, 29 False Alarms, and 19 Other. Inspector Molter and team performed 268 inspections.

<u>December:</u> WLFD responded to 248 calls: 171 Medical, 6 Fire, 9 Hazardous Condition, 25 Service Calls, 23 False Alarms, and 14 Other. Inspector Molter and team performed 191 inspections (224 hours).

The total number of runs in 2021 was 2,876: 86 Fire; 839 Non-Fire; 1,951 EMS.

The total number of inspections in 2021 was 1,075.





2021 Training







In 2021, the West Lafayette Fire Department put in 11,251.75 combined man hours of training, including EVOC, High-Rise Training, Pump Operations, Medical Training, Map Study, Pre-Plans, and Physical Fitness. Members took part in certification classes provided by the Indiana District Fire Training system, a Fire Instructors course at the District 4 Training Center, joint training with LFD at the District 4 Training Center, world-class fire training under live-fire conditions at the Fire Department Training Network; new and old building tours; EMT refresher training; extensive Search and Rescue, Ventilation, and Hose Line Operations training; and Leadership Development/Officer Development training.

In January, personnel refamiliarized themselves with apparatus equipment.

Medical training covered hypothermia. Officers took part in online training on the

new ESO run reporting system that replaced Firehouse. CAD went into service. Total man hours of training in January: 587.25.

In February, some personnel prepared for promotional testing. WLFD hosted the 400-block of the IDHS Executive Leadership Academy attended by personnel from all over the state. Crews trained with the new digital fire simulator, rescuing the Smart Dummy in heavy smoke conditions. Medical training covered AED for infant and child. Some members trained other City departments on proper fire extinguisher usage as part of the Leary Firefighter Foundation Grant. Total man hours of training: 1,064.75.

In March, each shift trained in the District 4 entanglement box, simulating being trapped by wires. The department continued its fire extinguisher training throughout the City. And medical training focused on state-mandated hands-on skills. Total man hours of training: 1,044.

April training consisted of members obtaining their Driver Operator Aerial Operator certification through the Indiana Department of Homeland Security. Personnel trained with Wabash Township and Tippecanoe Township fire departments in a vacant structure using the Leary Foundation's grant equipment to simulate a live-fire situation. Two members attended the Fire Department Training Network's live-fire training course. Total man hours of training: 1,184.

May began with West Lafayette hosting the Indiana Department of Homeland Security Executive Leadership Development class: the final class for the course. Several members took part. Medical training consisted of audit and review with Dr. Sansone along with treating anaphylactic reaction. Captain Doyle, Lieutenant Taylor, and Firefighter Zaragoza attended the National Fire Academy. Total man hours of training: 815.

June training included the Mobile State EMS Simulation Lab: a repurposed ambulance designed for high-fidelity EMS simulations. All personnel performed joint training with Lafayette Fire in live-fire scenarios at the LFD Training Center. Three members attended the Fire Department Training Network. And WLFD hosted the Indiana Fire Instructors Conference and Board Meeting. Total man hours of training: 780.

July training included the department reviewing the new and updated Standard Operating Guidelines. Personnel participated in joint training with Lafayette Fire. Members of TACC and West Lafayette School's athletic department visited to discuss proper handling of sports injuries. Tours included the Schweitzer and Campus House buildings. Medical training covered working in extreme temperatures, both hot and cold. DC Schutter attended Fire Rescue International's conference. And two firefighters attended Lafayette Fire Academy for new member training. Total man hours of training: 1,133.25.

August kicked off with how to treat work injuries obtained during extreme temperatures and using the new ring removal device. Members attended FDTN, LFD's cadet training academy, and Chief Need the Fire Chiefs Academy; hosted the annual training for Indiana District 3 car seat technicians and car seat technician certification course; and trained in Indiana's firefighter confidence trailer. Total man hours of training: 1,131.

September started with training through Vector Solutions: Blood Borne Pathogens, Driving Safety, and Response Guidelines for Amtrak accidents. Four firefighters continued training at Lafayette Fire Training Academy; several attended Lafayette Fire's Tactical Rescue, HazMat, and Rapid Intervention Crew air pack training sessions; DC Schutter attended National Fire Academy; and BC Scott Barker and Firefighter Zaragoza instructed WL Wastewater personnel on proper fire extinguisher operation. All of this plus individual training brought the total man hours of training to 1,003.5.

October was Fire Prevention Month, and WLFD celebrated by educating the public at both the Farmer's Market and the Parks Department's Fall Festival. Training included courses in driving safety, risk assessment, and how to read a fire. And three members attended the National Fire Academy: Captain Burton and Firefighters Linder and Mayer. All of this plus individual training brought the total man hours of training to 1,421.

November training covered several topics, including Driving Safety, Pump Operations, and Structural Collapse. And medical training focused on SIDS, bringing the total man hours of training to 573.

December training consisted of annual audit and review; touring the Continuum building and learning locations for fire panels, elevator control rooms, and roof access; and finishing any remaining required training. Total man hours of training: 515.

The West Lafayette Fire Department completed 11,251.75 man hours of training in 2021 which perfectly coincided with our mission: to protect our community's people, property, and environment through intervention, prevention, and education, ensuring West Lafayette is always a safe and great place to work, live, and play.
