NURSERY TIME

Congratulations! 2021 is the **30**th year West Lafayette has been designated as a Tree City USA® by the Arbor Day Foundation. Moreover, the West Lafayette Tree Friends (WLTF) celebrates **40** years of planting and pruning the City's 10,000 + street trees. Since the City is experiencing an increased demand for trees driven by urban development, climate change, and the Emerald ash borer devastation, the Friends are launching its most ambitious project to date. WLTF founder Helen Lillich proposed a home-grown solution years ago to build a municipal tree nursery to plant more trees for the community at a lower cost.

The goal is to raise \$50,000 to build a tree nursery that can support 720 trees in a 120' x 300' production plot. The project also includes building shelters where young seedling trees are protected, and native trees, shrubs, and plants can grow from seeds. The WLTF operates entirely on volunteers and donations. NEW TRAIL COMING TO TOWN



It's more than a trail. Salisbury & Grant streets are undergoing a reconfiguration to create a multimodal path for bikes, scooters, pedestrians, rollerblades, and strollers separated from the roadway by a newly-landscaped buffer zone.

The City of West Lafayette is now approaching 50 miles of trails!

As phases of the project are developed with trail and landscaping installation, please note there will be simultaneous utility realignment, new curb lines, and road resurfacing. As a result, residents will experience minor inconveniences during construction, which begins mid-summer.

Summer projects include paving Dodge, Evergreen, Garfield, Hayes, and Allen streets. The City is using a new oil-based asphalt rejuvenator to restore and preserve new asphalt to extend its durability. Be aware: a Tippecanoe County project has closed Lindberg between KBS Railway to US 231. It will reopen in late 2021.

THE POWER OF ONE

Thanks to the fundraising efforts of Girl Scout Lauren Kish of Troop #2748, the Lilly Nature Center received the financing to automate its entrance doors. Having surplus funds from contributions that purchased multiple ADA-accessible park swings, Lauren chose to use the rest to make it easier for children and adults with disabilities to enjoy the center.

PLAZA FOR THE PEOPLE

Beautiful changes are coming to downtown West Lafayette. Construction is underway for a new plaza for festivals and events between City Hall and the West Lafayette Public Library on Chauncey Avenue. The area between the two buildings will be closed until November. Beginning in 2022, Global Fest, Starry Night, and other events will be festival-friendly, with permanent power outlets for vendors and tables and chairs for the public. New benches, landscaping, trees, street lighting, and ADA crosswalks are also in store.

During construction, the City will lay a CSO Relief Interceptor pipe underground to improve drainage. In addition, new for-pay electric vehicle charging stations will be available along Chauncey Avenue, which will remain open for two-way traffic until blocked off for a party on the plaza.



We have much to celebrate as we re-emerge from a worldwide pandemic that affected every person in every culture. The next time you fire up the grill or light a torch or campfire, please remember these safety tips from the West Lafayette Fire Department:

- Keep grills, fire pits or fireplaces, and torches 10 feet away from your home and away from deck railings.
- Keep children and pets three feet away from your grill or fire. According to the National Fire Protection Association, roughly 9,500 people per year go to emergency rooms because of burns from grill fires or hot grills.
- Use grill mitts and long-handled utensils when grilling to prevent burns.
- Don't start fires in windy conditions (over 15 mph).

When not putting out fires, WL firefighters hone their skills by conducting training drills independently and alongside neighboring fire departments. They focus on fire attack, victim rescue, haz-mat, and other technical rescue skills to coordinate joint efforts for a safer community.

Every WL firefighter has completed training through Indiana's Driver/Operator Aerial class, enabling confidence in the safe operation of the department's two aerial devices. In addition, the department received a grant for a training system to educate the community on the proper use of fire extinguishers. Residents are welcome to attend free demonstrations at the West Lafayette Farmers Market on June 16 and October 6.

CHECK THESE BOXES FOR CYBER SECURITY

IT Specialist Tracey Stanifer-Dewey urges all citizens to become more aware of cyber threats to safeguard their online presence.

- □ Passwords: Don't use the same passwords twice, write them down, or share them. Consider creating a passphrase (without spaces) or using password-managing software.
- □ Phishing: Look for red flags such as bad spelling and grammar, urgent or threatening language, requests for money, and links/ attachments. If it looks suspicious, it probably is unsafe.
- ☐ **Software Updates:** Prevent malware infections and data leaks by keeping your devices and software up-to-date. Enable automatic updates wherever possible.
- □ **Social Media:** The more you share publicly, the bigger the target you become for scammers who gather intelligence and build profiles of their victims. Double-check your privacy settings and "friend" only the people you know.
- ☐ **Physical Security:** Shred sensitive documents when no longer needed, be aware of your belongings in public areas, and ensure screen and phone security.

LEAGUE CYCLING INSTRUCTOR EQUITY SCHOLARSHIPS

West Lafayette was awarded the bronze status for bike communities by the League of American Bicyclists. To support more biking across America, they have 40 scholarships for black people, indigenous people, and people of color (BIPOC) to attend out-of-state training seminars to become League Cycling Instructors. Before written meeting minutes were kept, Clerks were often called *remembrancers* because of their exceptional ability to retain and recall information.


Ancient Greece had a city secretary who read official documents publicly at the opening of a meeting. If someone was trying to deceive the people, this official could change their minds with a curse! American colonists set up local governments akin to those they were accustomed to and established the Clerk's Office to keep the records straight. West Lafayette City Clerk **Sana Booker** holds our past and documents the present for future generations.

POLICE STORIES

Mental health, addiction, homelessness, domestic violence, and abuse are realities for a community of over 42,000

year-round residents and 40,000 Purdue students. In response to an overwhelming need to provide assistance and resources for those in crisis, the West Lafayette Police Department hired a new (and first-time-ever) mental health professional. **Devon Moore** is a licensed clinical social worker who brings much knowledge to the force. Serving as the Social Service & Crisis Response Specialist, she will assist in getting to the root cause of an issue by partnering with local resources to make all attempts to break any routine cycle of behavior. Devon was chosen through a very competitive selection process.

Recognition is due for Officer **Jeff Dunscomb** who has loyally served the WL community for 30 years. His contributions to the agency include serving as a detective in the Criminal Investigations Unit and as a Tippecanoe County Drug Task



Force member, among other duties.
Officer Dunscomb is currently serving in the K-9 Unit alongside a specially-trained Hungarian Vizsla named **Bak**. Together, they detect narcotics and track suspects and missing persons. "Jeff is a true leader who inspires and mentors our young officers. We are very fortunate to have him," said Police Chief Troy Harris.
